1. Apologies and Chairman's Remarks

Apologies were received from:-

Terry Andrews, Laura Devlin, Martin Fahy, Katrina Hynds, Una Kelly, Kate Loughran and Lesley McCombe, Roisin Lecky

The Chairman extended his appreciation to Members dedication for the length of the evening on the back of the Community Planning Workshop and asked all Members to keep their input short and to the point.

The Chairman made the following points:

- ACC Harris was unable to attend this evening as scheduled but hoped to attend the January meeting.

- A request had been received from Crimestoppers to attend and present on their work at the January PCSP meeting.

The Chairperson said at the PCSP planning session back in January, it was agreed to review the frequency of our bi-monthly meetings.

ACTION: It was AGREED on the PROPOSAL of William Clarke, SECONDED BY Grace McQuiston, that the frequency of the PCSP meetings remain at bi-monthly.

In response to Michael Heaney's queries regarding the earlier Safety and Good Relations Thematic Working Group and the PCSP's role in the Good Relations area and other areas of that group, Ms Fearon advised it was agreed since the inception of Council that the PCSP would be the vehicle for Community Safety, and that Safety and Good Relations was delivered together as one of the four Thematic Groups (the others being Environment and Spatial, Health & Well-Being, Economic Development Regeneration and Tourism) . The first Safety and Good Relations meeting had been the visioning exercise In Newcastle in June.

Dan McEvoy concurred with Michael Heaney's comments and Audrey Byrne asked for Peace IV to be included.

The Chairman said the gap had occurred due to Statutory Partners perhaps not having the same ownership of the Community Plan. He stated it was important to bring all Statutory Partners along with the PCSP so that they could contribute and take something away from the Community Planning workshop to shape their work going forward.

ACTION: It was AGREED that officers clarify the PCSP's role in the Safety and Good Relations Thematic Working Group and also in the area of Peace IV.

2. Minutes of PCSP Meeting held on 20 September 2016

Read: Minutes of PCSP Meeting held on 20 September 2016.

ACTION: It was AGREED on the PROPOSAL of Dan McEvoy SECONDED by Sean Doran, that the Minutes be agreed as an accurate record.

3. Matters Arising

In response to Declan Murphy's question regarding the Community Safety Wardens, Ms Fearon advised the process had been readvertised as the successful bidder declined to take up the contract, but it was hoped that the Community Safety Wardens would be in place by Christmas.

4. Declarations of Interest

There were no declarations of interest.

5. Presentation – South Eastern Health and Social Care Trust (SEHSCT Update

Read: Presentation by Fergal O'Brien (SEHSCT) dated 22 November 2016 regarding an update on the South Eastern Health & Social Care Trust.

Fergal O'Brien gave an informative presentation on the work of the South Eastern Health and Social Care Trust. Copy of presentation available on request

Ewan Morgan referred to the work of the SEHSCT in respect of the Traveller Family Support, saying this was an area that had been neglected in the past, but had now seen tangible results.

The Chairman thanked Fergal O'Brien for his presentation, saying information leaflets provided by the SEHSCT were made available regularly at health fairs, etc.

6. PCSP Expenses

Read: Report by Siobhan Fearon, dated 22 November 2016 regarding PCSP Expenses.

Ms Fearon advised that correspondence had been sent to the Policing Board NI and to Council requesting additional meeting expenses given the volume of PCSP meetings. The response from the Policing Board NI had been included on the agenda for Members. She further advised that the Active & Healthy Communities held on 21 November 2016 had agreed to fund 2 additional PCSP meetings plus mileage. This decision had been forwarded for ratification at the Council meeting to be held on 5 December 2016, and would then be subject to a 5 day call-in period. Members to be updated as to the outcomes of Council decision after that time.

ACTION: It was AGREED to note the report on PCSP Expenses.

7. PCSP Planning Guidelines

Read: Report by Siobhan Fearon, dated 22 November 2016, regarding the PCSP Planning Guidance.

Ms Fearon advised Members that the Planning Guidelines document had been issued by the Joint Committee and would be the key document in informing the future action planning meetings. All members to read and be familiar with content in advance of January review meeting

ACTION: It was AGREED to note the PCSP Planning Guidance.

8. Officer Report

Read: Report by Siobhan Fearon dated 22 November 2016, regarding the Officer Report.

Dan McEvoy referred to the recent Neighbourhood Watch conference which he had attended, saying it was very informative and successful. It was noted that NHW coordinators preferred to be referred to as NHW Network

The Chairperson concurred with Dan McEvoy's comments and encouraged anyone to undertake neighbourhood watch.

9. Engagement Sub Group Report

Read: Report by Grace McQuiston, Chair of Engagement Sub Group dated 22 November 2016, regarding the Engagement Sub Group Report.

The Chair of the Engagement Sub-Group, Grace McQuiston said feedback on the questionnaires had been received. Also, each Member of the ESG had been asked to bring to the meeting the name of a hard to reach group, to pass to Andrew Kernaghan.

Andrew Kernaghan advised Members that as it had been Road Safety Week, the ESG proposed to go out into the District on a particular evening at 7pm to hand out high-viz jackets and leaflets to walkers. A short film on the campaign could also be made for promotion on social media. Andrew said this would be an easy win and would cost very little, but the message would still be promoted about being seen at night on the roads.

In response to a question from Jude Cumisky, Andrew Kernaghan confirmed he was working with the PSNI to distribute smaller high viz vests throughout the schools. He added that 7pm was the designated time to hand out the high viz as this was when adults were out walking.

Dan McEvoy expressed concerns over the branding on the jackets, saying some members of the public may not wish to wear branded jackets, although the idea was a good one. Grace McQuiston and David Taylor agreed that it was a good initiative, which the PCSP should receive promotion from. S Fearon stated it was important to promote the work of the PCSP and that public be aware who was running the initiative

William Clarke concurred that it was a good initiative, which should be evaluated.

ACTION: It was **AGREED** on the **PROPOSAL** of William Clarke **SECONDED** by David Taylor, that the minutes of the Engagement Sub-Group on 18 October 2016, be noted.

10. Anti-Social Behaviour Sub-Group Report

Read: Report by Harry Harvey, Chair of ASB Sub Group dated 22 November 2016, regarding the Anti-Social Behaviour Sub Group Report.

ACTION: It was AGREED that the minutes of the Anti-Social Behaviour Sub-Group on 26 October 2016, be noted.

11. Response to CJINI Report on ASB

Read: Report by Harry Harvey, Chair of ASB Sub Group dated 22 November 2016, regarding the Anti-Social Behaviour Sub Group Report.

ACTION: It was AGREED on the PROPOSAL of David Taylor, SECONDED by Dan McEvoy, to agree the draft response to the CJINI Follow up Review on ASB.

12. Bonfire Liaison Committee

Read: Report by Katrina Hynds/Andrew Kernaghan, PCSP Officers dated 22 November 2016, regarding the request to establish a Bonfire Liaison Committee.

Andrew Kernaghan explained that officers had contacted the other councils PCSP's in Northern Ireland to see how they dealt with bonfires. It was found that 2 other councils: Belfast City Council and North Down and Ards Council had Bonfire Liaison Committee's, which were dealt with through their Good Relations units. He advised that the Bonfire Liaison Committee, should members agree to set one up, it would be similar to Belfast City Council and North Down and Ards Council and would concentrate on times of community tensions namely the dates of 12 July and 8 August as there was the seasonal intervention grant would fund with the Halloween bonfires.

William Clarke expressed concerns that most of the issues arising from bonfires had been from Halloween bonfires, and as this was a community safety, Halloween should be included in the Bonfire Liaison Committee's remit.

William Clarke also referred to issues regarding the availability of tyres which were being burnt on the bonfires.

David Taylor concurred with William Clarke, saying there was a need for Halloween to be included in the Bonfire Liaison Committee due to previous problems with bonfires on that date.

Dan McEvoy advised he was not in favour of setting up a Bonfire Liaison Committee, but that it should be subsumed into either the Engagement Sub Group or the Anti-Social Behaviour Sub Group. He said there was a good relations aspect to the bonfires on 12 July and 8 August.

In response to queries, Ms Fearon said the PCSP's remit was to consider a request to establish a Bonfire Liaison Committee. Research had been

undertaken with other councils and the needs of Council and what was manageable from a PCSP and staffing perspective, had been investigated. She said if Members wished, then Halloween bonfires could be included in the remit of the Bonfire Liaison Committee.

A discussion ensued where Members expressed concerns that additional work could be created for the PCSP if a Bonfire Liaison Committee was set up.

Mr Lipsett reminded Members that the Bonfire Liaison Committee had worked well in both legacy councils and had reduced tensions around 12 July and on other dates too. He said problems now arising around Halloween meant that Halloween should be included within the Bonfire Liaison Committee's remit. He added that Council's position was clear that they wished the PCSP to reinstate a Bonfire Liaison Committee, which would include all bonfires.

William Clarke suggested inviting local DEA Councillors to a meeting if bonfires within that DEA were to be discussed.

ACTION It was **AGREED** on the **PROPOSAL** of William Clarke, **SECONDED** by Sean Doran, that :

- **The PCSP establish a Bonfire Liaison Committee in partnership with Council's Good Relations Department and to include other identified external and internal stakeholders.**
- **The Bonfire Liaison Committee deals with all bonfires**
- **The specific Terms of Reference for the make-up and roll out of this sub-group be drafted drawing on the learning from other Councils in relation to this.**
- **That specific financial penalties be built into any funding agreement.**

Dan McEvoy abstained from the above proposal.

13. Home Secure Report

Read: Report by Siobhan Fearon dated 22 November 2016 regarding Home Secure.

Strategic Objective 1: To successfully deliver the functions of the Policing and community Safety Partnership

Partnership Development

ASB & Engagement Sub Groups met,

Weekly social media updates on Facebook and Twitter profiles, with photographs as well as regular Press Releases issued to all media outlets regarding all public events and launches.

Monthly events schedule circulated

Strategic Objective 2: To improve community safety by tackling crime and anti-social behaviour

Anti-Social Behaviour Action Plans

The ASB Sub Group held their meeting on 7 December 2016 whereby sub group/ASB Action Plan Meetings with representatives from Carnagat, Ballymote and Castlewellan Road were discussed. Intervention work has commenced in these areas.

We continue to work with local agencies and the community to deal with general ASB incidents throughout the district.

Carnagat ASB

There has been a stakeholder approach to issues in the Carnagat area, Newry with different statutory agencies such as the Education Authority, Housing Executive, Translink, DOJ, YJA and PSNI regarding ASB in Carnagat. Discussions include the setting up of new youth schemes and crime prevention sessions for safer communities.

ASB initiatives

Mourne Mountain Adventure opened for registration with closing date 27th January 2017. Mourne Mountain Adventure will take place on 22nd April 2017

Community Safety Wardens

Elite Security successfully procured the Community Safety Warden tender and were visible in the streets over the Christmas period covering Newry, Downpatrick, Ballynahinch and Newcastle. Saturday Night cover will continue in Newry, Downpatrick, Newcastle and Kilkeel/Warrenpoint. Day/early evening patrols are currently being developed and will be reported on in full.

Drugs & Alcohol

PCSP Officers continue to work with the local schools and statutory agencies to help combat the issue of drugs/alcohol in local bus stations.

PCSP Officers worked in partnership with Start 360 to provide an Information Morning on Friday 2 December in the Canal Court. Local Agencies were present to offer advice on their services. A similar event is planned later in 2017.

On 15th December the PCSP, in partnership with the NIFRS, PSNI and NIAS held a Drink/Driving Campaign morning in SERC, Downpatrick. This included a car cut out involving the students. Information on alcohol/drugs was available and the 50/50 car was there to inform young drivers which modifications are legal/illegal.

The "One Punch" and "Without Consent" Programme was rolled out throughout the district during November and December. We are continuing to offer this to schools within the district during February/March.

New flyers on domestic violence for young people have been designed and will be distributed at our events for young people. We are also working in partnership with the SE Trust and other PCSP's to design up to date posters on domestic violence

Road Safety

Ongoing work across the district including the promotion of Hi-vis vests has been very successful for engaging with the general public, by the PCSP members as well as officers. PCSP continue to work directly with NIFRS and PSNI for a coherent and strategic approach to road safety events across the district.

We have members with statutory agencies and local community representatives to deal with issues and look at All Children's Integrated Primary School. A programme has been put in place for March 2017.

Neighbourhood Watch

Work continues on updating the NHW database by corresponding with PSNI in each DEA area to ensure that each scheme has a co-ordinator and that the correct contact information of each NHW co-ordinator is available. Also the PSNI are ensuring that we have information on all schemes and that no schemes are left off the database. Each NHW co-ordinator that was not in attendance at the NHW meeting on 8th November should have now received their NHW handbook and pack including a hi-vis.

Work is ongoing in relation to NHW schemes that are no longer running and signage is to be removed from those areas where there are no alternative co-ordinators willing to take on the NHW schemes that are already in place.

NHW schemes are currently being set up within Bessbrook, Camlough and Newry in response to burglaries before Christmas. Promotion of NHW continues and there will be an information afternoon for Council staff to promote PCSP and NHW in hope to set up more schemes.

Rural Crime

Trailer marking in Leitrim was successful. PSNI with PCSP have upcoming trailer marking events in January 2017 in Crossmaglen and Newry. There was previously a trailer marking event in Camlough attended by PSNI, Crime Prevention Unit and PCSP.

Hate Crime

PCSP continues to be attended and participate at NM & D Intercultural forum in Newcastle and sub-committee in Newry. Data continues to be collated across the district on BME engagement and participation in local events through consultation and surveys. Work with Diversity and Inclusion Unit in partnership with PSNI continues to support new Syrian refugees, ensuring new members of our community are welcomed and aware of the supports in place

Cross Border Conference in partnership with Good Relations will take place on 26th January

PCSP nominated for Pride in Newry award for our work supporting the LGBT Community

Fear of Crime

Similarly to the NHW talks; PCSP along with Police and the Home Secure scheme team have been attending work with groups to allay fears over crime. Some individuals and pensioners have been referrals from PCSP officers for the PSNI call with them to discuss ASB in their area, and learn from their local officers about points of contact for someone to talk to.

Strategic Objective 3: To support community confidence in policing

Coffee with Cops engagement continues on fortnightly basis across the district.

PCSP staff completed consultation with public at DEA Public Meetings throughout the District. Up-to-date survey results are now available and have been shared with PSNI to inform development of local policing plan. PCSP training sessions with PSNI LPT teams to promote the detail of the PCSP action plan have been completed.

2. Other PCSP Engagement Plans

Andrew informed the subgroup that he had contacted PCSPs from other council districts for information regarding their approach to the work being carried out. The only council district to respond was Armagh, Banbridge and Craigavon who explained they have three subgroups; 1. Hard to Reach; 2. Victims of Crime and 3. Engagement. ABC PCSP noted that they found successful engagement within the community difficult.

3. New Year Engagements

Further discussion took place regarding the proposed large-scale Cyber safety event first suggested by Audrey Byrne.

Action: Andrew to contact Mr Fusco, principal of St Mary's Primary School, Newcastle.

Members discussed the possibility of rolling this event out district-wide over a period of two/three years. Grace McQuiston added that Cyber-safety does not instantly attract the attention of the general public as a top priority. Members agreed on need to contact DEAs regarding themes to be addressed, minimising the chance of an overlap between DEA meeting themes and the proposed Cyber-safety event.

Action: Jessica / Lorraine to circulate dates of next DEA meetings to members

Members' discussed idea of a trial-run for the event in a small school, if successful this could be rolled out across larger schools. Brian Quinn stressed the need to encourage a legacy of trust and confidence in the PSNI and PSCP. Fiona Stephens when necessary she would request a list of schools and principals from the Education Authority. Andrew Kernaghan referred to Road Safety Calendars 2017 who were given out to schools who participated which generated a positive response.

Grace McQuiston expressed concern regarding low levels of engagement in response to a previous event ran by her employer; where all the schools in Northern Ireland were contacted but only four schools applied to take part. Grace suggested contacting the Education Authority could be contacted to pass down information regarding events to schools. Some education authorities have a Co-ordinator for pupils whom could be useful to contact, members agreed that official avenues may have more pull in securing schools' participation.

Action: Members to suggest any themes schools would view as important

It was undecided which type of schools should be targeted, with some members preferring to target secondary schools, attention was brought to the fact that no primary schools were targeted last year. Sports teams were also mentioned as a possible target group i.e. GAA & Rugby.

It was agreed that the Police and Teachers do not respond adequately to reports of cyberbullying despite becoming an epidemic and this should be addressed. A good way of demonstrating the effects could be inviting a key speaker such as Nicola Dennison to tell of her personal experience. Constable Kenny Gracey was mentioned for the successful event he ran in Newcastle in relation to cyber safety, in particular the presentation delivered. The presentation could be trialled to a steering group of young people to assess its suitability for delivery at this proposed cyber safety conference. Members pointed out that a more achievable method of delivery could be to select one school as the venue and inviting pupils to attend, instead of travelling to all schools in the area.

Action: Andrew to ask Kenny Gracey re: 1. response to one punch/without consent; 2. Availability of Carol Todd video; 3. Acting as speaker for proposed conference re: cyber bullying 4. Can attend the next engagement sub group meeting in February 2017.

1. Apologies

No apologies were made.

2. Minutes of Meeting held on 26 October 2016

The minutes of the previous meeting were accepted as an accurate reflection of business.

3. Community Safety Action Plans

a) Ballymote Community Safety Action Plan

PSNI have continued foot patrols in the areas where ASB had been an issue and had reported that levels had decreased and youth interaction with officers had been good. Translink had also reported that they had no further incidents and were happy to continue normal services.

NIHE representatives had visited tenants within Ballymote to deal with the issues.

NM&D Community Safety Officer has carried out a graffiti audit of the Ballymote area.

The issue of alleygating was discussed and Owen confirmed that Transport NI had ownership of the alleyway in question. This may lead to issues with gaining permissions from various agencies for these to be put in place. Also there may be an issue with the costs for carrying out this process.

Action: PCSP to organise meeting with statutory agencies re alleygating

An event has been organised for the elderly in Ballymote to be held next week on Wednesday 14th December at which there will be a presentation on crime prevention and home safety and will give the residents an opportunity to sign up to the Home Secured Programme run by the PCSP. An intergenerational programme was also in process of being actioned.

Katrina then updated the Members on the following initiatives;

LIFE Programme – NIFRS have secured additional funding for this project, they are to complete full costings and report back to PCSP before proceeding. It is proposed to run this out with young people from the Ballymote area and the Castlewellaan Road area.

The 5 week DJ Course has been postponed, Katrina to meet with Narene of EA Youth Services after holiday break to assess way forward.

A meeting is to be set up with NIHE to discuss the 'Where Is Your Child Tonight' campaign. Owen reported that NIHE had met in Newry to discuss Roll Out of this programme and will meet with representatives from Down as soon as is possible to move the campaign forward.

Both EA and Youth Initiatives services providing Outreach Facility within the Ballymote area, however these are on different nights.

Katrina advised the Members that she will be meeting with PSNI regarding the issues around young people congregating at McDonald's site. She is also continuing to investigate the provision of a facility for youth to meet.

PSNI is also to increase foot-patrols in Russell Park area to deal with ASB in this area.

b) Castlewellaan Road Community Safety Action Plan

Katrina advised that following on-going foot patrols in the area the issue of ASB had reduced.

In relation to the issue of youth using land on Castlewellaan Road as a scrambling park has been addressed by the PSNI. They patrolled the area and spoke to those involved explaining the situation to them. The Orange Order and Building Contractor have agreed to put measures in place to ensure the area is secured. PCSP to work along with other agencies to roll out initiative highlighting safety on off road vehicles.

County Down Rural Community Network in conjunction with the YMCA are organising a petition regarding traffic calming measures on Castlewellaan Road. PCSP & PSNI are organising a 'Chaos at the School Gates' style event in the pedestrian precinct in Newcastle which will involve young people from the Newcastle Primary School.

A meeting took place recently with SERC where they stated that they would like to see their facility on the Castlewellaan Road being used more. They are hoping to encourage adults

within the area to be involved in further education by providing smaller interesting programmes.

St Mary's Primary School has expressed an interest in the Primary School Intervention Programme which will be provided by the YMCA, Lisburn.

The Yule Logs project will be completed in time for Christmas. With a Friday night Soccer programme being rolled out in January in conjunction again with the YMCA, NIFRS also to attend to advise youth on dangers of malicious fires.

Work is still ongoing into the Bernagh Green Community Space and a clean-up of Burrendale Park has been organised to be completed in March 2017. Owen suggested that agencies meet regarding all issues surrounding green spaces with the option of estate walkabouts to engage residents on their views.

Owen also stated that the NIHE have a new Good Relations Officer for entire district – Mr Sean Brennan who would be working with all community groups and agencies to roll out the programmes required in all areas of the district.

The Chairperson then opened the floor for any other issues to be brought forward.

Grace McQuiston raised the issue of under-age drinking and drug taking on a pedestrian route which is Council owned property. Katrina confirmed that Andrew Kernaghan had investigated this with PSNI and she would ask Andrew to give Grace an update on this.

The Department has received the following advice from the Equality Commission NI regarding the submission of separate PCSP Equality and Disability Action Plans. This advice follows a request from Chief Executives at a meeting with Joint Committee in June 2016 on whether PCSP Equality and Disability Action Plans could be integrated into the Council Plans.

The Commission has in the past encouraged Public Authorities which have similar functions to co-operate when developing both their equality action plans and disability action plans e.g. joint consultation events etc. The principal reason for this advice has been to encourage public authorities with similar functions to learn from each other's experiences, make best use of resources and also to fertilise new and innovative ideas and approaches to the development of these plans.

However, public authorities are separately designated and are therefore required to have their own equality schemes, equality action plans and disability action plans. These are equality scheme commitments which also require public authorities to report on an annual basis on the progress of the implementation of these plans.

The functions of Councils and PCSP organisations are quite different and should, in practice, lead to the development of plans which reflect the functions of each organisation respectively. The action measures which make up an equality action plan should be specifically relevant to the functions of the public authority concerned. They should also be developed on the basis of an audit of inequalities.

This audit should gather and analyse information across the Section 75 categories to identify inequalities which exist for the service users of that particular public authority. They should also be identified and considered in the context of the specific functions of the public authority concerned.

Therefore, as outlined above it is a requirement that each PCSP, as a designated public authority, develops and implements its own equality scheme and associated equality action plan as well as its own disability action plan.
