Outcome: All people in Newry, Mourne and Down live in respectful, safe and vibrant communities

Indicator: Level of Social Connections

Humans are social creatures. The frequency of their contacts with others and the quality of their personal relationships are crucial determinants of well-being. People get pleasure from spending time with others. Furthermore , social networks can provide material and emotional support in times of need, as well as providing access to jobs and other opportunities. The Nature of social interactions also has wider implications beyond the immediate social circle, impacting levels of trust(Building Good Relations) within their community, which is important driver of other outcomes including democratic participation, crime and health.


The figures for the past 9 months to September 2016 for the Good Morning Programme are shown in the above table and we can see that during this 9 month period, Newry recruited 5 new volunteers while Down recruited 3 giving a total of 8 new volunteers for the Newry Mourne and Down District Council area.

Newry have 89 active volunteers and Down have 48 Totalling 137 active volunteers in the Newry Mourne and Down District Council area.

There have been 28 new referrals in the Newry & Mourne area with 20 in Down totalling 48 new referrals for the district.

The number of service users receiving a good morning call across the district is 886.

The graph below displays the number of Good Morning Calls made during the 9 month period, totalling 33,075.

The table below shows the number of financial assistance applications that Newry Mourne and Down District Council received in 15/16 to date.


The Grand total of applications for the year 15/16 was 539 applications across the various themes and these are broken down by DEA.





Level of Attitudinal Change – ARK Report

ARK carried out a research update in 2014 with regards to community relations, looking at how the 11 new super council areas differ in terms of attitudes on key indicators of community relations.

The graph below shows this in relation to the question posed about the percentage of NMDDC residents that believe that relationships between Protestants and Catholics are better now than five years ago.

We can see that in 2014, 58% of people questioned in NMDDC believed that relationships between both religions where better now than 5 years ago which was the highest percentage recorded across all 11 council areas.



ARK then asked people in each council area if they would prefer to live in a neighbourhood with people of only their own religion or in a mixed religion neighbourhood.

From the graph below we can see that 17% of those asked from NMDDC agreed to wanting to live in a neighbourhood with only people which was the fourth lowest percentage recorded across all 11 councils.
