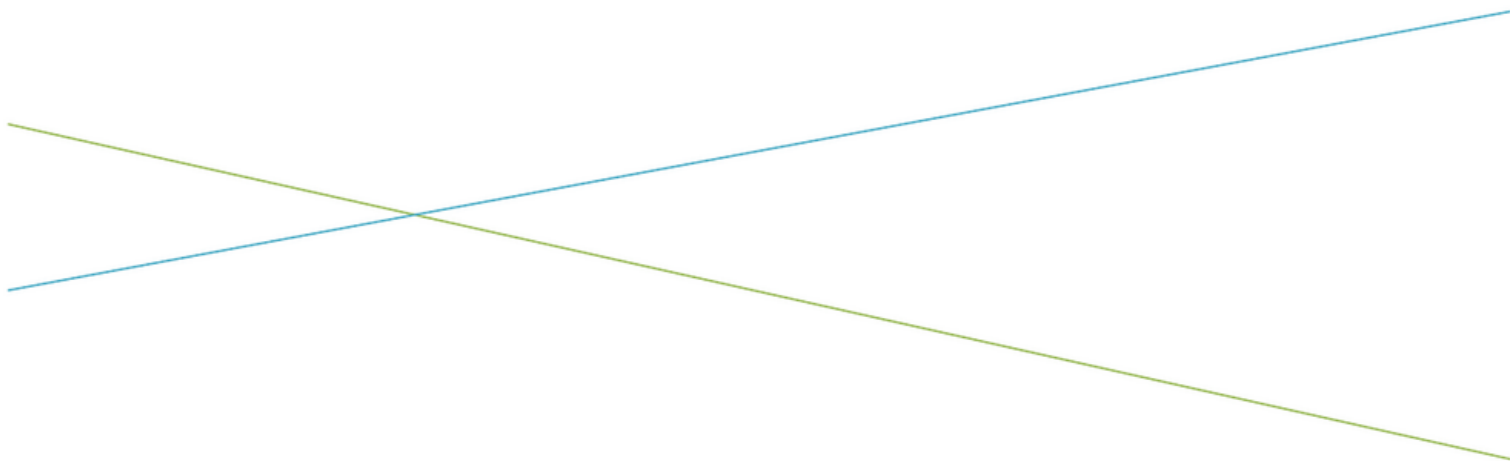

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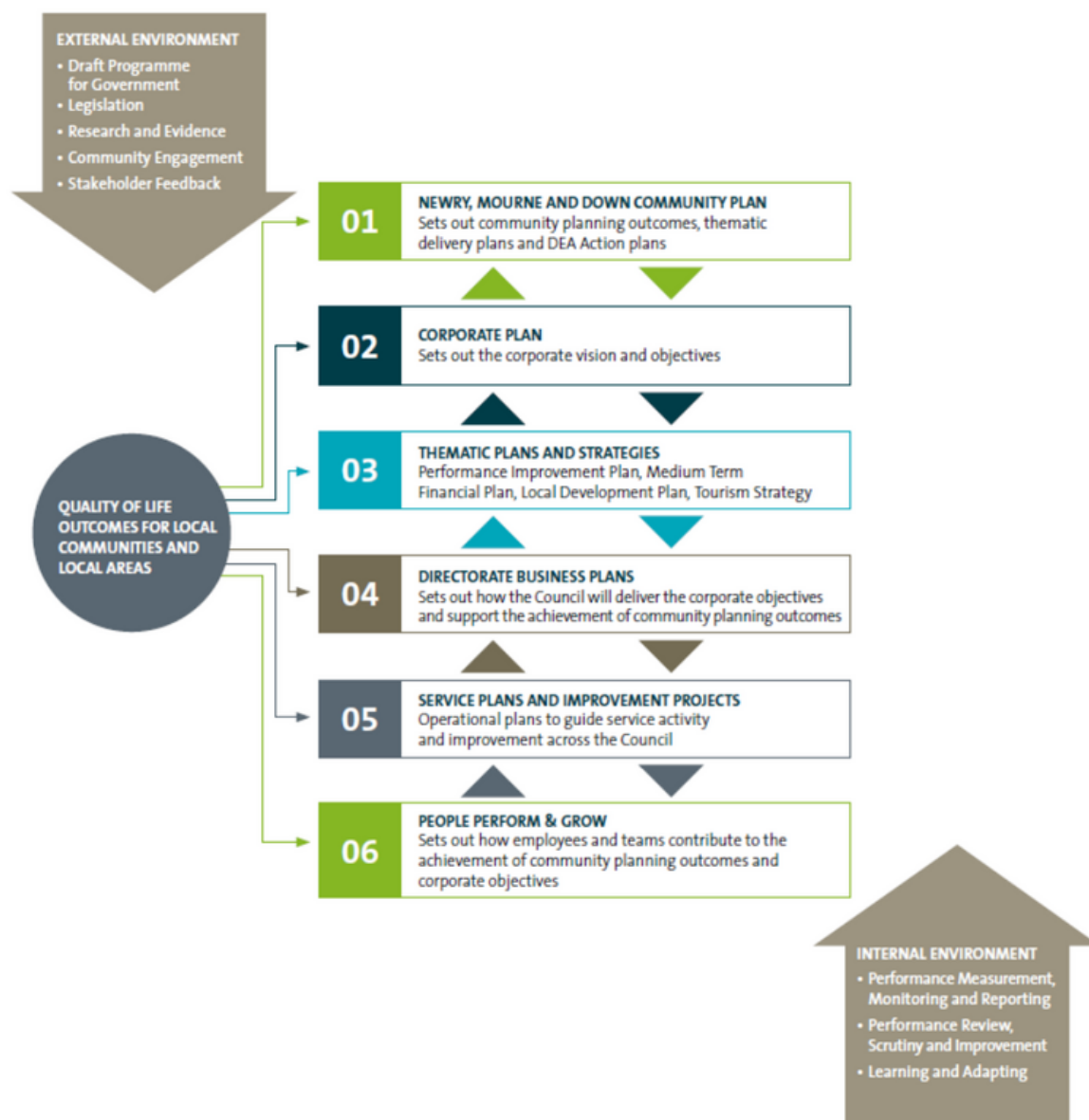
1.0 Introduction

- 1.1 The Active and Healthy Communities Directorate (AHC) is responsible for leisure and sporting facilities, health and wellbeing programmes and community engagement structures across the district. The Directorate has overall responsibility for the management of Safety and Good Relations and performs a lead role in promoting Community Planning within the Council and across the district.
- 1.2 The core responsibilities of the Directorate are:
 - **Leisure and Recreation**
 - **Parks and Open Spaces**
 - **Sports Development**
 - **Community Planning**
 - **Evidence & Research**
 - **Engagement and Community Development**
 - **Community Services, Facilities and Events**
 - **Safeguarding**

2.0 Background and Context

- 2.1 The AHC Business Plan is developed within the context of the Community Plan and Corporate Plan 2024-27. The Community Plan sets out the long-term outcomes for the District, based on the needs and aspirations of local people. The Corporate Plan sets out the key strategic objectives for the Council between 2024-27, and how it will contribute to achieving the community planning outcomes.

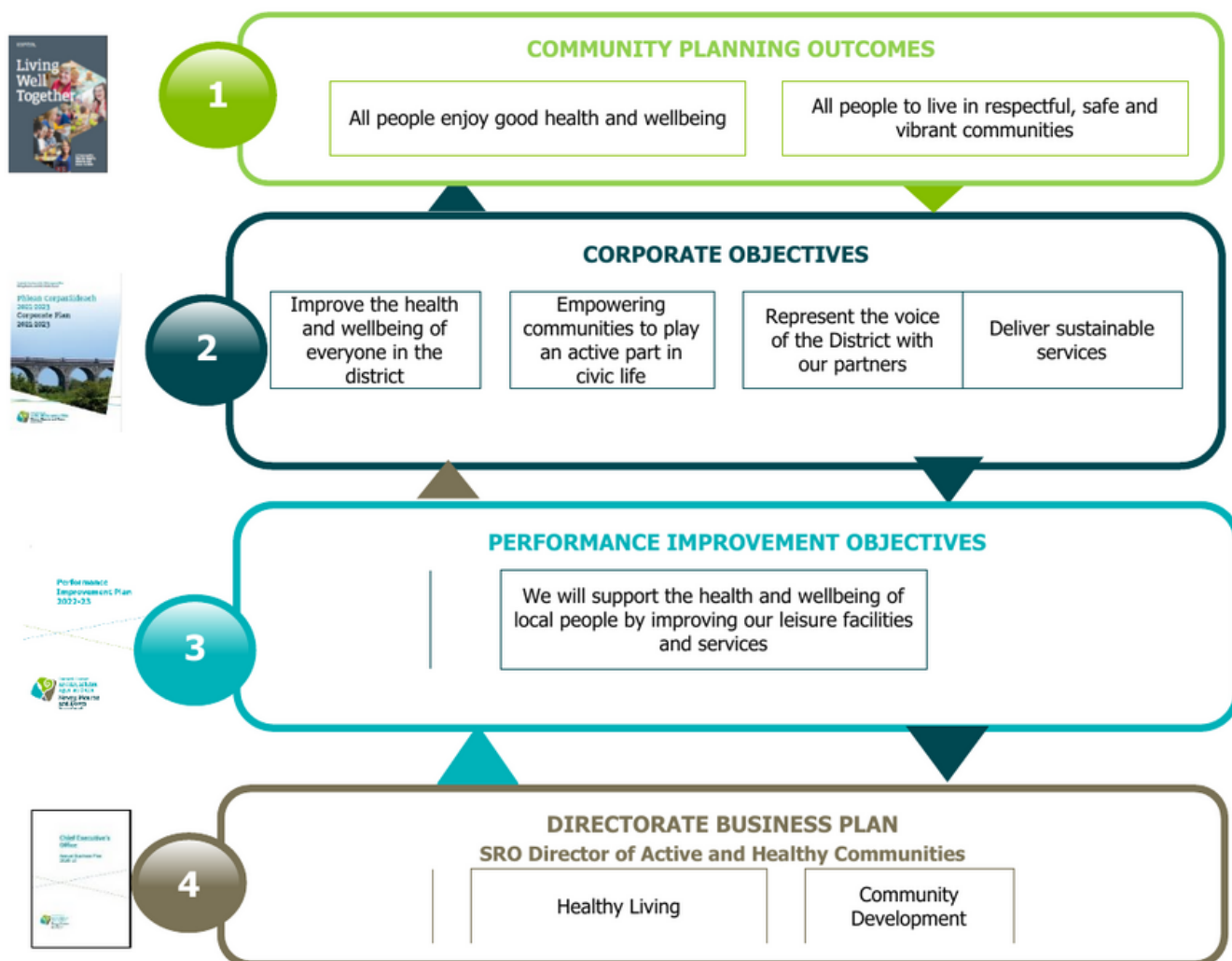
Figure 1: Business Planning and Performance Management Framework

- 2.2 The Community Plan and Corporate Plan are cross cutting and strategic in nature. They guide all activity within the organisation, as well as the subsequent allocation of resources, and sit within a hierarchy of plans, as outlined in the 'Business Planning and Performance Management Framework' (Figure 1).
- 2.3 The Business Planning and Performance Management Framework drives and provides assurance that the Council is delivering its corporate vision and objectives, whilst securing continuous improvement in the exercise of functions. It provides a mechanism to join up and cascade the various plans and strategies across the organisation, demonstrating how employees contribute to achieving community planning outcomes and corporate objectives, for the ultimate benefit of the citizens we serve.

2.4 Whilst the Corporate Plan focuses on issues which cut across the organisation and are strategic in nature, the AHC Business Plan provides an overview of the key operational activities for the coming year. These activities are explicitly linked to corporate objectives and coupled with 'business as usual' service delivery, provide clear direction for all employees within the Directorate (Figure 2). Directorate Business Plans are supported by Service Plans and the 'People Perform and Grow' initiative.

2.5 The AHC Business Plan is published annually and is the basis upon which performance is managed and reviewed by the full Council, Active and Healthy Communities Committee and Senior Management Team.

3.0 Purpose and Values

3.1 Purpose

3.1.1 The primary purpose of the AHC Directorate is to develop, implement and monitor key strategic frameworks to support better leisure, sport, health and wellbeing outcomes and build community capacity and promote good relations at a local level.

3.1.2 The bulk of departmental activity is aligned to the following corporate objectives:

- Improve the health and wellbeing of everyone in the District
- Empowering communities to play an active part in civic life
- Represent the voice of the District with our partners
- Deliver sustainable services

3.2 Values

3.2.1 The Department adheres to the Council’s values which are outlined in the Corporate Plan 2024-27:

4.0 Challenges and Opportunities

4.1 The Active and Healthy Communities Directorate was established in December 2014. The Department continues to evolve in line with organisational change and remains committed to developing and embedding the necessary plans, policies and processes to deliver improvement across the organisation. Influences within the external and internal environment continuously present challenges and opportunities, which have an impact on the overall management and operation of the Active and Healthy Communities Directorate.

4.2 The various (internal and external) challenges and opportunities for the department are summarised as follows:

External Environment

- **Legislation:** Ensuring legislative compliance with The Local Government (NI) Act 2014 and subsequent Orders, specifically in relation to the Duty of Community Planning, Duty of Improvement and Political Governance, legislative changes as a result of potential EU Exit.
- **Strategic Alliances:** Collaborating with stakeholders to address the impact of Brexit and continue to operate amidst wider political uncertainty.
- **Community Planning:** Strengthening existing partnerships and progressing the implementation of the four Thematic Delivery Plans to support the achievement of the long-term community planning outcomes.
- **Local Government Reform:** Addressing legacy issues and successfully integrating the new powers and functions created by Local Government Reform.
- **Evidence Based Decision-Making:** Ongoing collation of national, regional and local datasets to inform and influence local decision-making, policy development and service provision.
- **Global trends:** Considering the impact of COVID-19, Brexit, cost of living crisis, climate change, complex social issues, the needs of a growing and ageing population, growing health inequalities, increased demand for public services, fluctuations in crime and rates of anti-social behavior and rising customer expectations on public service provision.

Internal Environment

- **Management:** Successfully establishing Directorate in terms of its structure, governance and internal processes.
- **Resources:** Identifying and securing the financial and non-financial resources needed for the Directorate to promote healthy and sustainable communities.
- **Structure:** Implementation of new departmental structure to ensure delivery of the corporate objectives and to meet the challenge of corporate restructuring and transfer of new or emerging services.
- **Legislation:** Ensuring corporate legislative compliance in respect of key statutory obligations, including Equality (Section 75), Performance Improvement as well as Community Planning which augments existing service delivery.
- **Community Planning:** Developing partnerships that will deliver local area-based plans to deliver on the Council's Community Plan.
- **Performance Management:** Continually monitoring and reviewing the department's performance, highlighting areas of high performance as well as identifying areas for intervention.
- **Transformation and Improvement:** Successfully developing and implementing a transformational programme of change that drives out the efficiencies and improvements that both members and the public demand.
- **Property and Land Assets:** Successfully developing and implementing the necessary frameworks, policies and processes to support the effective and efficient management of the department's estate.

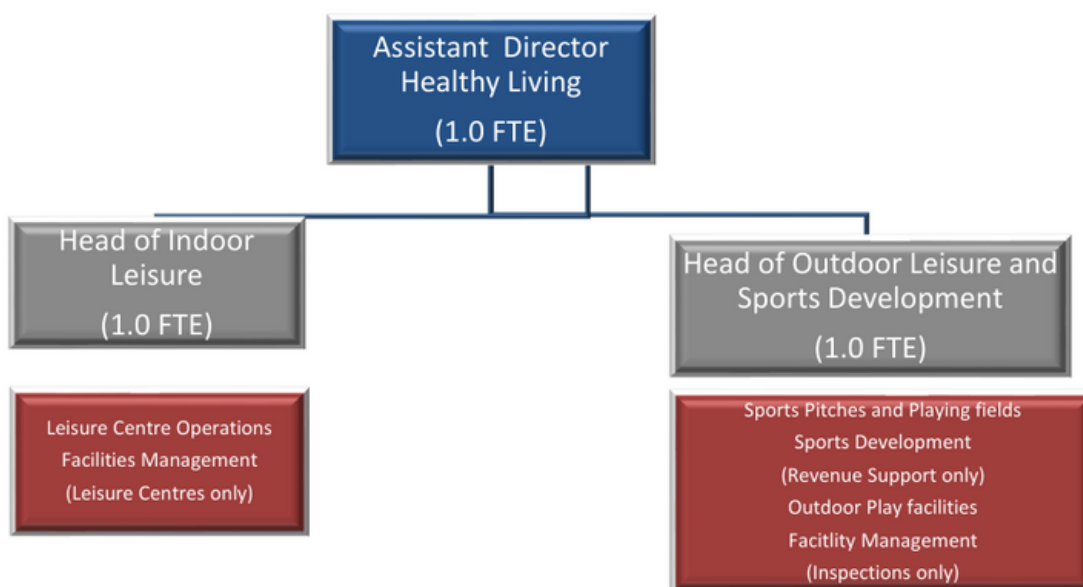

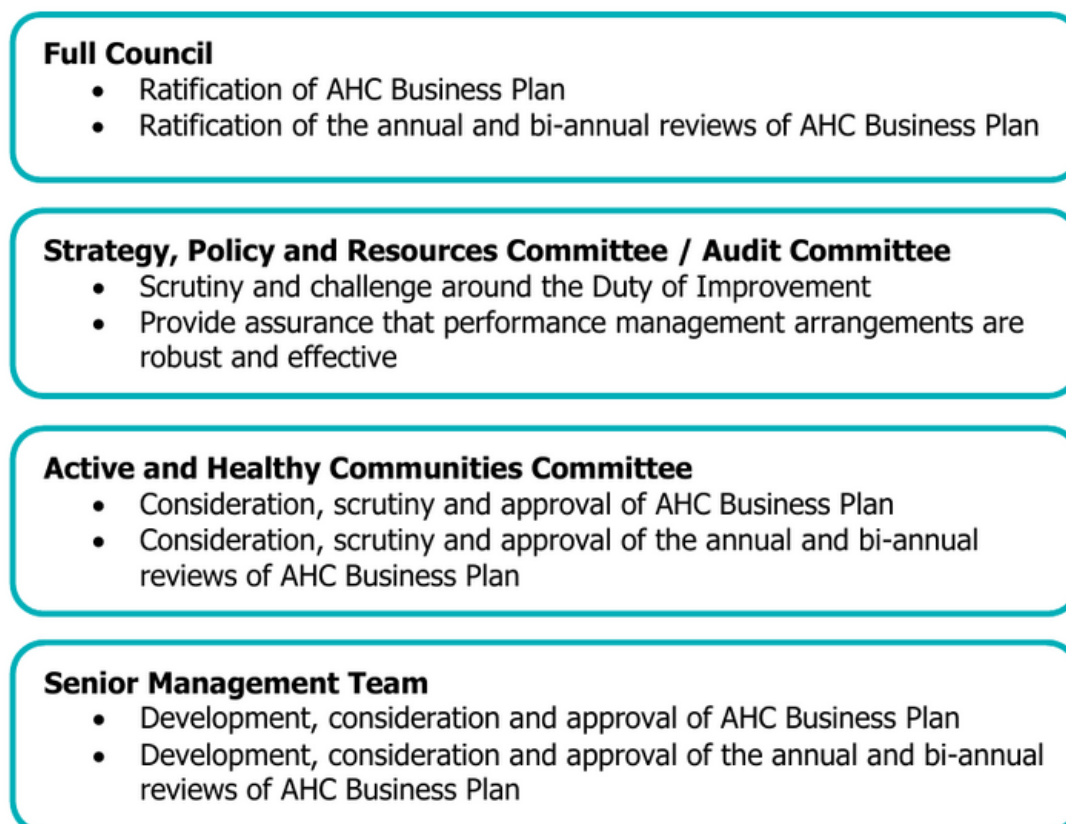

Men's Fest

Planning is progressing for Men's Fest, a collaborative initiative between Newry, Slieve Gullion and Crotlieve DEAs, scheduled to take place on 10 June at Newry Leisure Centre. The event will promote social connection, wellbeing and learning opportunities for men through a range of activities, including health and wellbeing sessions, physical activities, health awareness stalls, free haircuts and an alcohol-free social space. Promotion is ongoing across partner organisations and community networks, with councillor invitations issued.

Wildlife in the City

Preparations are underway for the Wildlife in the City event, scheduled for 20 June at McClelland Park, Newry. The family-focused event aims to promote biodiversity, environmental awareness and community engagement through interactive activities and educational displays. A wide range of environmental and wildlife organisations have confirmed participation. Publicity materials are currently being finalised and promotion is expected to commence by the end of next week.

Seniors' Summer Scheme 2026

Newry, Slieve Gullion and Crotlieve DEAs are working collaboratively to deliver the 2026 Seniors' Summer Scheme from 29 June to 3 July across venues in Silverbridge, Warrenpoint and Newry. Planning is progressing well, with activities and funding arrangements being finalised. The programme will promote social inclusion, wellbeing and active ageing through a varied programme of activities. Thirty places

have been allocated to each DEA, with promotion scheduled to launch by the end of next week.

Newry Water Festival

Planning continues for the Newry Water Festival, which will take place on 31 August at Albert Basin, Newry. Delivered in partnership with Neighbourhood Renewal, the event will provide a range of free family activities while encouraging increased footfall within the city and The Quays area. Initial planning meetings have been completed and operational arrangements, including road closure applications and event documentation, are progressing. Engagement with local businesses is ongoing, with support from Newry BID to maximise economic opportunities associated with the event.

Additional Engagement and Support Activities

- Newry DEA is hosting the "Icons on Ammo Boxes" exhibition in partnership with Ukrainians in NI at Newry City Library from 15 June to 3 July. A programme of Good Relations activities is also being developed in conjunction with Refugee Week.
- Continued attendance at Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership meetings throughout the reporting period.
- Ongoing support provided to local community organisations, including Breast Mates Newry and Newry Felons Association, in relation to community engagement and project development.
- Continued attendance at Interagency Meetings within the Barcroft, Derrybeg, Greater Linenhall and Drumalane areas to support partnership working and local initiatives.
- Initial planning meetings have been completed for the 2026 Mela Festival, which is scheduled to take place on 30 August 2026. Preparations are progressing in partnership with key stakeholders.
- Progress continues on the IBP Pride of Place Award nomination for Road Ahead NI. The organisation has formally accepted the nomination and expressed appreciation for the recognition. A proposed judging date has been submitted and confirmation is awaited.

1 Welcome, Chairperson's Remarks and Apologies

PCSP Chair Councillor Henry Reilly welcomed all attendees to the meeting and noted apologies from Superintendent Lynne Corbett, Cllr Conor Galbraith, Cllr Declan Murphy, Michelle Osbourne, Aidan McCabe, Claire Crainey & Louise Kennedy.

Chair Cllr Reilly noted that this was the last meeting of the 2025/26 Financial Year and expressed that he looks forward to the incoming year working on the 2026/27 Action Plan.

The Chair noted that March in particular had been a very busy month for PCSP. He noted the exceptional Road Safe Roadshow event at Shimna High School, the Ending Violence Against Women and Girls Showcase Event in Newry and the Launch Event for the drug awareness video 'Impacts of Cocaine: The Human Cost.'

Cllr Reilly also advised that Colleen McCreesh would be stepping down in her role as a PCSP Independent Member, and extended thanks on behalf of the Partnership for her service and commitment during her time on the PCSP.

The Chair also welcomed Roy Edwards and Andrea Barr to their first meeting as newly appointed PCSP Independent Members.

Chair Cllr Reilly then outlined the housekeeping rules for the meeting.

Chair Cllr Reilly reminded members that they were personally responsible for their comments and further noted that the meeting was being recorded to assist with the minutes.

2 Declarations of Interest

None recorded.

3 Draft Minutes of previous PCSP & Policing Committee Meeting held on 3rd February 2026

Read: Minutes of PCSP & Policing Committee Meeting held on 3rd February 2026 (copy circulated).

Agreed: On the proposal of Cllr Andrews seconded by Cllr Taylor it was agreed to approve the Minutes of the Policing Committee and PCSP Meeting held on 3rd February 2026 as a true and accurate record.

4 Matters Arising

Ms Shannon Creaney provided an update on the proposal from the previous meeting on 3 February to send a letter from PCSP to the Lady Chief Justice. Ms Creaney advised this letter was sent on 17th February 2026 and a response was received from the Lady Chief Justice Office on 16th March 2026. Ms Creaney

confirmed that a copy of both the initial letter and response had been shared with the partnership via email.

Chair Cllr Reilly thanked Ms Creaney for sending this letter to the Lady Chief Justice and noted he was disappointed with the response. Cllr Andrews endorsed the Chair's comments and stated he hoped that prosecutions do follow.

Cllr Andrews then asked if there had been any further updates on the threats made to Councillors. Chair Cllr Reilly advised that an update will be given on this query during the District Commander's Report – agenda item 8.

5 PCSP Officer Report

Read: PCSP Officer Report (copy circulated via email)

Ms Shannon Creaney advised that the PCSP Officer Report was for noting and that a detailed report is included in the PCSP Meeting Papers.

Ms Creaney highlighted some of the events that have taken place since the previous meeting. Firstly, she noted the Community Safety and Wellbeing Event that took place in Newry Leisure centre on 6th March where there was over 100 people in attendance and over 30 stallholders. Ms Creaney noted this is a successful example of partnership working and expressed it was a great opportunity for the PCSP to provide safety and wellbeing information to the wider public.

Ms Creaney also noted that PCSP supported the EVAWG Showcase on 25 March in the Canal Court Hotel in Newry. She also noted the Launch of a Drug Awareness Video 'Impacts of Cocaine: The Human Cost'. Ms Creaney noted both of these events were very well attended and that they highlight key messages such as Drug and Alcohol Awareness and Domestic and Sexual Violence featured in the PCSP Action Plan.

Ms Creaney then noted the Drugs and Alcohol plays by the DSM Foundation which PCSP recently delivered to 6 schools across the Newry, Mourne and Down District. Ms Creaney advised that in addition to these plays, PCSP staff have organised a number of Theresa Burke drug awareness talks in local secondary schools.

Ms Creaney highlighted some upcoming events/work. She noted that PCSP was successful in an application for the Assets Recovery Community Scheme Funding from the Department of Justice. From this, Ms Creaney advised a scam awareness video has been created, which will be shared with members once completed.

Chair Cllr Reilly thanked Ms Creaney for her report and thanked the PCSP Team for their hard work over the recent months.

Cllr Andrews endorsed the Chair's comments and thanked Shannon Creaney for her detailed report. He thanked the whole PCSP team for their work and encouraged it to continue.

6 ASB Sub Group Reports

7 Mobile Speed Indicator Devices Update

Report: Mobile SID's Update

Martina Flynn noted that the report was presented for information. She reminded members that, at the January 2025 PCSP meeting, approval was granted for the procurement of five Mobile Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs) for use by the PSNI Neighbourhood Teams across the district. She advised that these were funded through an underspend in the PCSP staff costs budget, as outlined in the report submitted for approval at that time.

Mrs Flynn further noted that the January 2025 report specified that procurement was conditional upon the PSNI agreeing to Terms and Conditions for use. These included the requirement for PSNI to add the devices to their asset register and to take responsibility for their replacement in the event of loss, theft, or damage. She confirmed that the District Commander at that time agreed to these Terms and Conditions, and procurement proceeded at a cost of just over £14,000.

Mrs Flynn advised that the devices were procured and handed over to the PSNI in July 2025. However, since that time, PSNI have advised there have been challenges relating to insurance cover, resulting in the devices remaining in PSNI storage and not being deployed across the district. She added that, in the absence of any direction from the PSNI regarding insurance in recent weeks and months, Officers have explored alternative proposals for the use of the devices should the PSNI be unable to proceed with deployment as planned. Ms Flynn advised these options are detailed within the report.

Mrs Flynn stated that tonight's meeting provided an opportunity for the PSNI to give an update and outline a timeline for deployment. She highlighted that, should the PSNI choose to proceed without insurance cover, neither the PCSP nor the Council could accept liability for any issues or incidents arising. Again, Mrs Flynn advised this position is reflected in the report.

Mrs Flynn confirmed that the request to the PSNI is to provide:

- A timeline for deployment of the 5 Mobile Speed Indicator Devices; and
- Confirmation regarding insurance cover, or otherwise.

Chair Henry Reilly expressed disappointment that the Mobile SIDs have not yet been deployed. He noted that he had spoken with Superintendent Corbett the previous week, who indicated willingness to deploy the devices under PSNI general insurance, as is the practice in Armagh, Banbridge and Craigavon Council area.

Chair Reilly stated that, if the PSNI are prepared to proceed under their general insurance arrangements, he would support this approach and wish to see the devices deployed across the district. He proposed that deployment proceed on this basis.

Cllr Mathers welcomed the proposed deployment of the Mobile SIDs and asked for an update regarding the fixed SID in Camlough, which is currently not operational.

Ms Shannon Creaney advised that work is ongoing to address the issue with the Camlough SID. She noted that, as outlined in the report, the cost of repair is significant, estimated at over £1,000. Ms Creaney further advised that the supplier had recently attended site to inspect the unit and identified an issue with the pole, which will need to be replaced, in addition to repairs to the sign itself. She confirmed that she will follow up on this matter after the meeting.

Cllr Andrews thanked Mrs Flynn for her update on the Mobile SIDs. He expressed disappointment that the devices have not yet been deployed and welcomed any solution that would resolve the issues identified. Cllr Andrews confirmed that he was happy to second the Chair's proposal to adopt the Armagh, Banbridge and Craigavon model, whereby the SIDs would be deployed under PSNI general insurance.

Cllr Hanlon sought clarification in relation to section 3.1 of the report, specifically regarding the proposal to repurpose the Mobile SIDs to support existing SID infrastructure.

Mrs Martina Flynn responded that officers had sought direction from the PSNI on the current position; however, this was not provided in time to inform the report, and therefore the report was prepared based on the information available at the time the meeting papers were finalised. She advised that Ms Creaney had been tasked with exploring alternative options for the use of the Mobile SIDs should the PSNI be unable to deploy them as originally agreed under the Terms and Conditions. Mrs Flynn explained that, to avoid loss of the initial investment, the supplier had indicated that component parts could potentially be used to repair or replace existing fixed SIDs. She clarified that this option was explored as a contingency measure in the event that the Mobile SIDs could not be deployed as planned. Mrs Flynn

reiterated that a clear timeline and deployment plan from the PSNI is required to progress the matter.

Cllr Hanlon expressed disappointment that the Mobile SIDs have remained unused, noting that the issue may have been resolved more quickly through engagement with legal or insurance representatives. While acknowledging that repurposing component parts may provide value and avoid waste, she stated that this should be considered a last resort. She emphasised the importance of deploying the devices across the district, highlighting that speeding is a key concern for residents, particularly in light of increasing road fatalities. Cllr Hanlon stated that she wished to leave the meeting with assurance that the SIDs would be deployed as originally intended.

Mrs Martina Flynn advised that she had engaged with the Council's Legal Department and insurers, who confirmed that the Council cannot take responsibility for insuring the devices, as it does not store, maintain, or deploy them. She reminded members that it had been recorded in the January 2025 minutes that ownership of the devices transferred to the PSNI. Mrs Flynn added that all available options had been explored and that the PSNI had given the matter significant consideration. She concluded by noting that the PSNI present should be in a position to provide further clarity on their intended approach.

Chair Reilly reiterated that he had spoken with Superintendent Corbett and stated that, if the PSNI are prepared to proceed with deployment under their own insurance arrangements, this approach should be supported and progressed.

Cllr Hanlon clarified that her earlier reference to legal and insurance engagement related to the PSNI's arrangements, rather than those of the Council.

Chief Inspector Adam Ruston advised that the PSNI had encountered some unforeseen issues relating to insurance for the Mobile Speed Indicator Devices. However, he confirmed that the PSNI now propose to adopt an approach similar to that used by PSNI colleagues in the Armagh, Banbridge and Craigavon area, where Mobile SIDs are currently being deployed.

Chief Inspector Ruston stated that the PSNI is now in a position to proceed with deployment across the Newry, Mourne and Down district. He advised that, following completion of a risk assessment within the next 7–10 days following the meeting, Neighbourhood Policing Teams will commence deployment of the Mobile SIDs. He further advised that Neighbourhood Officers will not leave the devices in place for extended periods, in order to ensure appropriate monitoring and to minimise the risk of theft or damage.

Agreed: On the proposal of Cllr Henry Reilly, seconded by Cllr Terry Andrews, it was agreed that PSNI proceed with the deployment of the

Mobile SIDs in line with their proposed plan for deployment and cover for insurance.

Chair Reilly thanked Chief Inspector Ruston for the update and expressed that he looks forward to seeing the devices deployed within the coming weeks.

Cllr Truesdale welcomed the update, noting that SIDs are effective in reducing vehicle speeds and expressing satisfaction that the issues have now been resolved.

Cllr Taylor also welcomed the resolution of the matter and requested that Councillors be provided with the list of locations identified for planned Mobile SID deployment. He noted that he is aware of additional areas which may require consideration, if not already included.

Mrs Martina Flynn confirmed that the list of proposed deployment locations can be shared with Members. She added that, now that a timeline has been established, and the SID's will be deployed within the next two weeks, this presents a valuable opportunity for positive community engagement. She suggested that communications could be issued via social media to encourage members of the public to report areas of concern for potential inclusion.

8 Policing Committee Business District Commander's Report – March 2026

Read: District Commander's Report – Period 4 (copy circulated)

Chief Inspector Adam Ruston presented the report on behalf of Superintendent Lynne Corbett.

Chief Inspector Adam Ruston provided a brief overview of key updates before presenting the report. He began by referring to the attack on Lurgan Police Station earlier that morning, which he strongly condemned. He advised that, as of this evening, the situation in the area is returning to normal.

Chief Inspector Ruston also informed members that recruitment is currently underway for 49 officers for the Newry, Mourne and Down district. He noted that it is anticipated these officers will be in place by September and expressed hope that this will mark the beginning of an increase in officer numbers across the district, particularly within Neighbourhood Policing Teams.

He further highlighted that the district's outcome rate for reported crimes stands at 34.5%, which is above the overall Police Service average for victim outcomes.

Engagement

Chief Inspector Ruston advised that, in terms of engagement, the PSNI will continue to prioritise a focus on vulnerability and risk.

He highlighted the success of the recent Road Safe Roadshow and noted that there are plans to explore opportunities to roll this out further across the district.

Chief Inspector Ruston also reported that the PSNI Newry, Mourne and Down social media page has achieved a reach of approximately 1.6 million, the highest within the Police Service.

He further noted that the PSNI is beginning to pilot the PSNI Connect app and confirmed that a full briefing will be provided at the next meeting. He added that the app will support improved communication with the public.

Hate Crime

Chief Inspector Ruston reported an increase in hate crime, particularly in relation to racial incidents, with the majority occurring in the Newry area. He advised that the PSNI is progressing further engagement and educational initiatives, including work within schools, to address this issue.

ASB

Chief Inspector Ruston reported that levels of anti-social behaviour (ASB) have decreased over the past 12 months, with a reduction of 132 incidents. He advised that current ASB levels are below average; however, an increase is anticipated over the Easter period.

Chief Inspector Ruston highlighted several key areas of concern, including:

- Apache Pizza, Warrenpoint
- Daisy Hill Hospital - incidents involving abusive behaviour towards staff
- Dublin Road, Newry - anti-social driving
- Bryansford Road, Newcastle
- Market Street, Downpatrick - issues relating to e-scooters

Domestic Violence

Chief Inspector Ruston reported that incidents of domestic violence have increased over the past 12 months. He noted a particular rise in victims within the 30–39 and 50–59 age groups.

He advised that incidents involving intimate partners remain a significant issue and added that the PSNI is progressing engagement work with older people to address this area.

Chief Inspector Ruston highlighted that outcome rates have increased by 31%, reflecting effective policing responses. He also noted a positive aspect to the rise in reported incidents, indicating that more victims feel confident coming forward.

He further referenced the One Stop Shop initiative in Newry and Crossmaglen, noting that the Crossmaglen service, the first of its kind in the Slieve Gullion area, had two attendees to date, which was considered encouraging.

In addition, he advised that Operation Encompass has recorded 466 incidents so far in the current academic year.

Road Safety

Chief Inspector Ruston addressed road safety matters and began by noting the recent tragic death of an 11-year-old pedestrian in Kilkeel. He advised that, in the

year to date, there have been four road fatalities and 124 people seriously injured across the district, representing the highest figures in Northern Ireland.

Chief Inspector Ruston outlined ongoing enforcement activity, including 48 detections for speeding offences, 47 for careless driving, 18 fixed penalties and court referrals relating to vehicle defects, 36 referrals for drink or drug driving offences, and 18 detections for driving without insurance.

He also referenced the recent school bus crash in Belleek and commended the heroic actions of older pupils who assisted younger children during the incident.

Drugs

Chief Inspector Ruston provided an update on drug-related activity, advising that there were 689 drug seizures and 234 arrests recorded over the past 12-month period.

He highlighted that the use of postal services and "drop-off hubs" for the distribution of drugs is an increasing concern within the district.

Chief Inspector Ruston also noted that RAPID bins have recorded approximately 50,000 disposed items in the year to date.

Crime

Chief Inspector Ruston provided an overview of crime trends across the district. He reported an increase in sexual offences, rising by 35 incidents, noting that a spike in October was largely attributable to the reporting of historical offences.

He advised that domestic burglary has decreased over the reporting period, while commercial burglary has shown an increase.

Chief Inspector Ruston also highlighted an increase in rural crime, particularly involving the theft of trailers and break-ins to vans.

South Armagh Review

Chief Inspector Ruston provided an update on the South Armagh Review. He advised that works at Newtownhamilton Station are currently ongoing, while developments at Crossmaglen remain at the planning stage.

He also highlighted the need for enhanced cross-border pursuit arrangements, noting that this would require legislative changes at Stormont to progress.

Assault on Police

Chief Inspector Ruston reported on incidents involving assaults on police officers, noting that 19 officers had been assaulted over the reporting period, with seven of these incidents occurring since March. He highlighted a recent incident in Newcastle in which an officer was struck by a male individual. He advised that the individual was subsequently released by the courts back to the Newcastle area despite having no fixed abode.

Significant Incidents

In relation to significant incidents, Chief Inspector Ruston referenced a pipe bomb incident in the Ashgrove area of Newry. He advised that an individual is currently under investigation and noted that the victim had previously been the target of a similar pipe bomb attack.

This concluded the PSNI District Commander's Report

Chair Henry Reilly thanked Chief Inspector Ruston for delivering a comprehensive report. He noted his relief that the situation at Lurgan Police Station did not escalate further and welcomed the update regarding additional police recruitment.

Cllr David Taylor commented that the District Commander's report highlights the significant challenges currently faced by the PSNI and welcomed the news of additional resources being allocated to the district. He referred to the recent bus crash in Whitecross and extended his condolences to the family of the bus driver. Cllr Taylor also expressed his appreciation to the pupils who responded and assisted during the incident, as well as to the PSNI and other emergency services for their response.

Cllr Taylor raised concerns regarding rural crime, particularly thefts in the Newtownhamilton area, and expressed hope that sufficient resources would be made available to address this issue. He also queried the ongoing works at Newtownhamilton Police Station, noting concerns that works did not appear to have commenced despite an associated road closure being in place. He further highlighted that signage indicating a three-week programme of works for November had not been updated, which is causing confusion for road users.

Chief Inspector Ruston responded by advising that it will be a number of weeks before the full phase of works at Newtownhamilton Station commences. He confirmed that he will follow up on the matter of updating the signage to ensure clarity for road users. He also emphasised that rural crime remains a priority for PSNI teams and will continue to be a focus for targeted policing activity.

Cllr Oonagh Hanlon thanked Chief Inspector Ruston for his comprehensive report. She referred to issues involving e-scooters on Market Street, which she had witnessed firsthand, noting that she had spoken directly with some of the young people involved. She described the situation as intimidating and expressed concern about the use of e-scooters on public roads, warning that it could lead to serious consequences.

Chief Inspector Ruston responded by advising that the use of e-scooters in public places is an offence. He noted that when young people are returned home, the matter is not always taken seriously by parents. He emphasised the need for greater parental awareness and education and suggested exploring the development of a television campaign aimed at parents.

Cllr Aidan Mathers commented on the recent pipe bomb incident in Newry and queried how information is communicated to local residents. He also highlighted an increase in attacks on Translink vehicles along the Camlough Road in Newry.

In response, Chief Inspector Ruston advised that other PSNI departments set specific criteria regarding safety perimeters, which the PSNI must adhere to. He also confirmed that he would review the incidents involving Translink vehicles further.

Cllr Terry Andrews expressed his thanks for the District Commander's report and the ongoing work of the PSNI. He welcomed the anticipated recruitment of additional

officers to the district. He raised concerns regarding speeding on the Bryansford Road and asked that this be examined. He also highlighted incidents in Crossgar Square involving damage to residents' doors.

Roisin Leckey raised concerns regarding incidents in the Rostrevor area involving the killing of lambs. She noted the seriousness of this behaviour, referencing research indicating that violence towards animals can be linked to wider patterns of violent behaviour.

Cllr Jill Truesdale noted that she had attended an anti-racism protest in London and commended those taking part. She also acknowledged the increasing confidence of survivors of violence against women and girls to come forward and report incidents, recognising the work of the PSNI and PCSP in supporting this. She stressed the importance of continuing initiatives such as the One Stop Shop to support women. Cllr Truesdale also raised concerns regarding e-scooter fire incidents and associated health and safety risks, querying whether the PSNI is engaging with the Northern Ireland Fire and Rescue Service (NIFRS) to communicate key safety messages. She further thanked officers in Newcastle for their work in addressing ongoing issues and acknowledged the positive impact of traffic enforcement measures in reducing anti-social driving in the area.

Chief Inspector Ruston confirmed that the PSNI will liaise with NIFRS to develop and promote safety messaging relating to e-scooters and fire risk.

9 Date of Next Meeting

Before meeting close, Chair Cllr Henry Reilly invited all members present to introduce themselves and outline the department they represent, for the benefit of newly appointed Independent Members.

PCSP Chair Cllr Henry Reilly then confirmed the next PCSP & Policing Committee Meeting will take place on Tuesday 26th May 2026 in the Council Chamber, Downshire Civic Centre, Downpatrick.

With there being no further business, the meeting concluded at 19:23.
