1. Apologies and Chairman's Remarks

No apologies were received.

Councillor Hearty welcomed all to the meeting, acknowledging it was his first Meeting as Chair of the Committee. He welcomed the new Committee, particularly the newly appointed Councillors and introductions were made.

2. Minutes of Policing Committee Meeting held on 19 March 2019

Read: Minutes of Policing Committee Meeting held on 19 March 2019 (copy circulated)

Agreed: On the proposal of Councillor Ruane, seconded by Councillor Walker it was agreed to approve the Minutes of the Policing Committee Meeting as a true and accurate record.

3. Matters Arising

Ms Kelly asked if the Agenda could be issued earlier, given that the Meetings were held on a bi-monthly basis.

Mrs Flynn said she appreciated the Agenda had been issued slightly later than usual. However, she advised this had been due to the Local Government Elections and the appointment of new Committee Members following the Council AGM on Monday 20 May. On this occasion, it had not been possible to issue the Agenda any earlier.

4. Declarations of Interest

There were no Declarations of Interest.

5. District Commander's Report – Period 2

Read: District Commander's Report – 28 May 2019 (copy circulated).

Chief Inspector Joe McMinn presented the District Commander's report to the Committee.

Following the presentation, discussion took place and the following points were raised:

Blues on the Bay Festival

- There had been widespread underage drinking and ASB at the Blues on the Bay Festival that had been held from 22 – 27 May, although Committee Members stressed this was not a negative reflection on the PSNI.
- The Festival was an economic driver locally, and the incidences of underage drinking and ASB had a very negative impact.
- Important to put a plan in place to avoid a repetition at future festivals. A forum could be set up to include all stakeholders from the business community to work alongside the Festival Committee.
- PSNI agreed to support any initiative in counteracting the underage drinking and ASB that had become prevalent at the festival in recent years.

- The perpetrators were not just from the locality, and although they had caused widespread disruption, it was important to note that many other people had enjoyed the festival without incident.
- Clonallon Park had been a focal point for a lot of the ASB.

ASB in the District

- PSNI to address the ongoing ASB on the Bryansford Road and Shimna Road in Newcastle via social media outlets.
- PSNI acknowledged that when responding to a recent crime in the South Armagh area they had inadvertently entered the wrong house. They said they were not happy with how the operation had been handled and they recognised this type of error had reflected very negatively on them.
- Members voiced their concern at this very serious error by the PSNI and said the family whose home had been entered had been very frightened by the experience.
- It was acknowledged that a lot of work still has to be done in building confidence in the PSNI across the entire District.
- Concern was expressed regarding an increase in the level of vandalism in the Rowallane area. A seven week diversionary programme that involved working with young people in the Rowallane area had proven to be very effective in reducing ASB in the area, however that programme was no longer running. Approx £1,500 – £2,000 p.a. would be required to further support these diversionary activities. It was agreed that community engagement was needed in the area, with PSNI, PCSP, Council and the local schools all having a role to play in trying to tackle the ASB in the area.
- The PSNI were unable to comment on a recent attack that had taken place in Barcroft Park, Newry where the perpetrators had filmed the incident, as they said it was a live case.
- There was an increase in the level of ASB incidents in the estates in Downpatrick and a recent spate of burglaries had taken place in Castlewellan and surrounding areas.

RAPID Bins

- It had been agreed for one RAPID Bin to be located at North Street Carpark, Newry – this had been done in conjunction with Newry BID. A second Bin has been located at Hughes Convenience Stores in Camlough, this had been agreed following discussions with the Hughes family.
- A lot of engagement was needed and a build-up of trust with the owners of potential sites for the location of additional RAPID Bins; insurance and liability were issues that needed to be addressed.
- To date, 7,500 items had been deposited into the RAPID Bin located in Kilkeel, 95% of the drugs recovered were prescription drugs.
- It was agreed that some consideration should continue to be given to Council owned properties as potential locations for the location of additional Bins.

Traffic Management

- There appeared to be an improvement in traffic management and speeding enforcements in the Newry area.
- Ongoing parking issues at Drumalane and the Flagstaff Road need to be addressed. There is potential for forty parking spaces under the flyover near the Flagstaff - an additional park and ride facility is needed here.
- Traffic management monitoring to be undertaken on the Forkhill and Newtown Roads, with additional signage being explored as an option to reduce speed.

- The siting of a pedestrian crossing was being explored in a further effort to reduce speed on the Forkhill Road, outside Mulkearns Eurospar. There is also a need for speeding patrols in this area.
- There was a need to extend the 30mph speed restriction outside Cloughoge Primary School to include the Chancellors Road.
- PSNI to continue in their efforts with regard to addressing the traffic management and parking issues in the Dromalane / Newtowncloughoge areas.

7. Date of Next Meeting

It was agreed the date of the next meeting would be Tuesday 30 July 2019 at 6pm in the Mourne Room, Downshire Civic Centre.

There being no further business, the meeting concluded at 7.10pm.

Executive Summary:

Verified crime figures are included up until 31st May 2019 in this report. Statistics branch have advised that verified June figures will be available in our next report.

Victim Update and Support: - 98% of 4559 victims of crime in Newry Mourne and Down have received an update within the 10 day target.

Community Engagement: - We have delivered Crime Prevention Presentations to senior citizen groups; Church groups; men's sheds & Schools among others. Details in main body of report.

Anti-Social Behaviour: - There has been an overall general decline in the number of ASB reports across the District in May and June of this year compared to last.

Inspector Hardy has produced a useful table and statistics in the main body of this report which gives an area specific breakdown of Anti-Social Behaviour Incidents.

Hate Crime: - There has been a reduction in reported hate incidents from 20 in the previous two months to 12 in May and June, and a reduction on the same period last year, from 19 incidents. Further details in the Vulnerability section of the report.

Domestic Abuse: - We have three Crime Prevention officers across the district whose role also covers victims of Domestic Abuse. Statistics relating to Domestic Abuse are in the body of the report. There has been an increase in the number of Domestic Incidents representing more confidence for victims reporting these matters.

Vulnerability: - A district wide Community Support Partnership has been established with partner agencies, and is chaired by Martina Flynn.

Crime: - Total police recorded crimes for April & May was 1316. This is a 2.9% increase on

last year's figures. Detailed figures are included in the report.

Road Safety: - The summer anti Drink Drive campaign was launched in June.

Our Road safe priorities over this reporting period were Motorcycle & Cycle Awareness, and Drink/Drug Driving. Our district had the largest decrease in road fatalities in 2018/19 compared with the previous year. Details in report.

Drugs: - Our local community have voiced their support to officers on the ground, particularly in South Down during recent operations. We have also presented the dangers of drugs at several schools over the relevant period.

Rapid bin sites identified and bins installed placed in Camlough and Newry.

Downpatrick site identified and due for installation this month.

<p>There has been an overall general decline in the number of ASB reports across the District in May and June of this year compared to last. June has seen an increase of ASB in each Sector compared to May, coinciding with the end of the school term and warmer weather.</p> <p>Newry DEA has the highest number of ASB incidents reported in Newry LPC, mainly occurring in the Ballybot ward (63 in total over the two months). Within Downpatrick LPC, the majority of reports are found in the Downpatrick DEA, with 75 this year, mainly occurring in the Cathedral and Knocknashinna wards. Newtownhamilton and Crossmaglen have the fewest reports of ASB in the District</p> <p>Representatives from the Downpatrick Community Collective, residents groups and PSNI will be meeting up to discuss ongoing issues regarding ASB within Downpatrick following on from the successful meetings between town centre business owners and PSNI over the past year. There are still issues within the town centre in relation to ASB however the focus has moved back towards the estates and Mount Crescent. All areas continue to be the focus of attention of LPTs and NPT when not attending calls for service.</p> <p>In Rowallane, meetings are being set up with local residents by PCSP members. One has already been carried out in Killyleagh, which proved useful in establishing better contacts with the</p>

	<p>community and providing a platform to manage the expectations of residents. At time of writing, another has yet to take place in Saintfield but it is anticipated to run along the same lines (confirmed that this meeting took place 18/07/19).</p> <p>Within Slieve Croob and Mourne, crews have carried out beat patrols in areas of concern identified both by incident reports as well as information provided by representatives. An issue for PSNI at the minute is in relation to the monthly youth disco. Police officers provide a presence in the area before and after each event to minimise risk to the public due to ASB or intoxicating liquor, and continue to liaise with the organisers in relation to their legal and licence obligations.</p> <p>In May, neighbourhood officers assisted Clanrye group with filming at Newry Market, and met with NMDDC at Warrenpoint town hall to deal with ASB at recycling sites. St. Claire's Abbey Primary School was given sessions on ASB and aspects of keeping safe both at home and when away.</p> <p>In June, meetings continued with ASB forum, NIHE (for whom we completed 26 reports), and other inter agency meetings re supporting communities. Beat patrols concentrated on shopping centres, and the following in Newry - Drumalane, Pool Lane, Thomas Street, Cleary Crescent, parts of Derrybeg & Carnaget.</p> <p>Workshops for junior staff at a local beauticians and an officer attended SRC and took part in the "Human Faces" program. We joined colleagues working at the "Festival of Flight" in Newcastle.</p> <p>ASB talk St Colmcilles Downpatrick prior to end of term. NPT and other colleagues also provided attention to the bus station on a daily basis in relation to youths attending the Belsonic music festival in Ormeau Park over the course of its two weeks, seizing and disposing of a large quantity of intoxicating liquor in the process.</p> <p>Bicycle patrols have been conducted in Warrenpoint, the quad has been deployed to South Down and will be utilised in tackling anti-social behaviour. Reports of scramblers and quads racing on the beaches, ASB in and around caravan parks and town centres around South Down will be targeted by officers on foot, bicycle, quad and patrol car.</p> <p>Engagement with Newry Street Unite, PCSP, Housing and Shared Communities re ASB in Newry Street area of Kilkeel, and 'It's a knockout' which was postponed in June will run in September 2019.</p>

Our district shows an 8.5% increase in Domestic Abuse Crimes. This is compared with the national increase of 10.2%. Latest verified figures show that violence against the person represents 69% of all domestic crime reports. We work closely with statutory and voluntary agencies to ensure victims get the help they need, to highlight the issue of Domestic Abuse and to explore ways in which we can keep people safe. In addition to uniformed officers trained to respond to and investigate domestic incidents, PSNI also has dedicated domestic abuse officers across Northern Ireland to ensure all domestic abuse crimes are investigated, as well as providing support and information to victims about police procedures and legal proceedings.

We responded to local concerns in relation to parking issues and, after warning and educating several FPNs were issued in the area of Daisyhill hospital for this offence.

We continue to work closely with partner agencies and had a successful operation with DVLA in May.

NPT and LPT have assisted at schools where traffic issues have raised concerns, including St Macartans PS, Saul Road and English St. Signs provided by PCSP have continued to be rotated to other schools within the sector to draw attention to parking issues and the dangers they may cause.

On 21st May 2019 South Down NPT met with DFI Road Service and PSNI Traffic Management at the lay-by on Slievenaman Road convenient to the Kilkeel Road which has seen a recurring issue of anti-social driving. This has consisted of large numbers gathering effectively closing the road while some involved put on a display of exhibition

driving. Police have launched disruption and enforcement operations however the long term proposal is to work with DFI Roads, PCSP, NMDDC and the Mourne Heritage Trust to provide architectural measures to prevent the activity.

South Down NPT has also responded to concerns raised by residents of the Rostrevor Road, Hilltown. Complaints have been received regarding speed on the stretch passing Dana Place. Speed enforcement operations have been implemented and a report sent to DFI Roads. DFI have advised that they will be placing safety measures in the form of new signage and markings as well as progressing a survey for a footpath.

A Road Safety presentation was delivered to Carrick Pre-School, Burren with Road Safety and seatbelts/baby seats delivered to Sure Start in Kilkeel and Warrenpoint.
