The outcome of screening is that the suggested establishment of a Financial Assistance Scheme – re: Languages not be subject to an EQIA (with no mitigating measures required).

Newry, Mourne and Down District Council's Equality Scheme requires Council in

carrying out its functions to have due regard to the need to promote equality of opportunity, and regard towards the desirability of promoting good relations.
