Dependants	Persons with dependents may be people who have personal responsibility for the care of a child (or children), a person with a disability, and / or a dependent older person.
	There are 61,998 households in Newry, Mourne and Down, 37.5% of which have dependents. With regard to these figures, dependents are defined as those aged 0-15 years or those aged 16-18 years who are in full-time education and living with their parents or grandparents. Similar to the regional trend, the proportion of households with dependents in the District has declined from 50% in 1981 to 37.5% in 2011.
	There are 5,466 lone parent households with dependent children in Newry, Mourne and Down which equates to almost 9% of number of total households in the District and is the fourth highest in Northern Ireland, after Belfast (17,036), Derry and Strabane (6,337) and Armagh, Banbridge and Craigavon (6,337). Half of the parents in lone parent household in Newry, Mourne and Down are unemployed, almost a quarter are in full time employment and over a quarter are in part time employment. 89% of the parents in lone parent households are female compared to 11% who are male.
	In 2012, the teenage conception rate was 1.02 per 1,000 mothers, which is the third lowest in N.Ireland before Lisburn and Castlereagh and Fermanagh and Omagh.

As noted, it is recommended the draft Strategic Community Plan not be subject to an EQIA (with no mitigating measures required).

The Draft Strategic Community Plan has been developed following an extensive engagement exercise. This included an initial engagement process of 9 District wide events and an online survey, which concluded in March 2015. This identified key priority areas relevant to community planning themes (Feedback Report March 2015).

This was further enhanced by 2 District events for the Community and Voluntary Sectors which led to the establishment of the Strategic Stakeholder Forum which has nominated 14 CVS representatives onto the Community Planning governance structure.

A Baseline Evidence Report was compiled to support development of Community Plan outcomes. (Community Planning Evidence Baseline Report, July 2015).

Seven District Electoral Area Fora were established and undertook 21 local engagement events.

Further consultation will be undertaken on the Draft Strategic Community Plan, between October 2016 and January 2017.

There will be three strands of the partnership which will interact with each other but with defined roles that Support 'internal' and 'external' partnership accountability; Provide a strong focus on delivery of outcomes; Develop a joint partnership performance framework; and Ensure clear Partnership communication.

Membership at all levels in the structure will be made up of Elected Members from the Council, representatives from Statutory Partners such as the Education Authority, Police Service of Northern Ireland, the Health Trusts, the Public Health Agency and other, plus the Community and Voluntary Sector.

The governance structure will support input from the community at all levels, particularly through the 7 District Electoral Area Fora as a member or via public meetings.

Community and Voluntary representative on the 4 Thematic Groups are appointed by the Strategic Community and Voluntary Sector Stakeholder Forum and the Chair and Vice Chair of this Forum are members of the Partnership Board.
